Montana Talking Book Library (MTBL) September 21, 2013 – November 20, 2013

Prepared for the December 11, 2013, Commission meeting by Christie Briggs, Regional Librarian. This report represents accomplishments of MTBL staff: Briggs, Gunderson, Landry, Meier, Stanton, Harris, Crepeau and 90 volunteers.

Goal One – Content – *Montana State Library (MSL)/MTBL acquires and manages* relevant <u>quality content</u> that meets the needs of Montana library partners and patrons.
