
ARPA Questionnaire Results

These responses were gathered from Montana librarians in October 2021.

Response rankings - first and second choices (most to least):

- 1. Deposit one-time credits into shared accounts for current state-administered e-content providers such as OverDrive and DPLA across platforms that serve different types of library audiences (publics, tribals, schools, academics, specials)
- 2. Initiate or extend one-year trials for resources embedded in current state-administered services (example: adding Universal Class or SAT test prep offerings via MontanaLibrary2Go), with the understanding that future state or federal funding may not be available to sustain the service
- 3. Offer one-year subscriptions to remote-access online resources or mobile applications that extend library services during the pandemic, with the understanding that future state or federal funding may not be available to sustain the service
- 4. Initiate one-year trials for new e-content service models, such as pay-per-circ like Hoopla or Kanopy, with the understanding that future state or federal funding may not be available to sustain the service
- 5. Invest in one-time purchase of standalone electronic resources that do not require an internet connection, such as Playaways or Wonderbooks

Other suggestions for electronic resources that would be eligible for one-time-only purchases?



Comments:

- Online learning should always be a priority for libraries during the COVID crisis.

- Due to the rising costs on local internet service and television options, we have an increased volume of DVD check outs. I wish I could list student support as a higher priority, but students are seriously tired with the online learning adventure. If we could offer one on one in person tutoring, I think that would be a great program.
- I already filled out the top portion of this form, but thought of something else that may be very useful for libraries: funding for an automated calling service so staff is not spending time calling patrons who have long overdue items or have not provided an email.
- I see a need right now for education with the book challenge issues we are facing as librarians. Support and education would be greatly appreciated balanced with collection building opportunities (on line classes maybe). We are going to have a tough couple of years as far as challenges are concerned.
- I also feel making sure we keep libraries in schools is vital. Our smaller schools are not able to maintain librarians and libraries putting pressure on OPI to maintain the librarian requirements for accreditation. It is important that we continually provide library/ librarian support. Maybe run a campaign of the importance of school libraries, if it is one shot money that keeps us in the academic conversation.



 start as a temporary service, as canceling it was a big deal and made lots of library fans very sad,
 though they were ultimately understanding.
