Stories

Lewis and Clark Library - "Several staff members were able to attend the Annual Conference here in Helena in 2019. The grant award made it possible for more than 10 staff members to attend the conference. Several staff were able to present. "

Jefferson County Library - Boulder - "Librarians from Boulder and Whitehall attended the Montana Library Association conference. Everyone took different classes so we could make the most of what we learned. Then we shared our new knowledge with each other and were able to start new programs, improve some of the programs we already have and make sure library staff has the knowledge they need to stay up-to-date with things that are happening in other libraries."

Jefferson County Library - Boulder - "Librarians were able to pay hotel rooms for library aides to attend the conference. They were able to network and learn from other aides how to improve the customer experience in their libraries; thereby making customers more likely to come to the library to seek out information. When customers do come in with questions, library aides are better equipped to answer their questions and show the customers how to find what they are looking for."

Broadwater School and Community Library - "Great training. Lots of great peer interaction and workshops.

My two favorite was about collaborating with fellow teachers and Makerspaces. Great ideas for Summer Reading Program, classrooms ideas and programming."

Broadwater School and Community Library - "Motivation, Mindset and Grit workshop. Great motivation for building relationships and developing a library environment for learning. Great information on guided imagery and visualization."

Meagher County/City Library - "The ability to attend regional workshops assists in the growing and diversifying of services we are able to provide for our patrons. "

Meagher County/City Library - "Gathering with libraries from similar, as well as different areas aids in problem-solving and networking with a wider diversity of librarians. Sharing of experience and providing networking opportunities are a vital part of keeping library resources and services up-to-date!"

Butte-Silver Bow Public Library - "Funding covered a portion of the costs to send several staff to MT Library Association annual conference. Staffers are able to connect with other library professionals and exchange info on programs, best practices, challenges and solutions. Further, it serves to re-energize our interactions with our community. We get excited again about the services we provide to our community and the vital role of the Library."

Hearst Free Library - "Sam Walters and Colleen Ferguson attended training sessions and meetings related to the operation of the library such as the Montana Library Association conference, the MSC meeting, and a Federation meeting."

Belgrade Community Library - "We have spent our \$877.05 for professional development. 1. All staff are enrolled with the Montana Library Association. Our enrollment fees allow us to vote on MLA issues important to our library, be proactive in moving forward Montana Libraries legislative agenda, and attend the annual conference at a reduced rate. 2. The remaining funds were spent having four staff attend the MLA conference in Helena. We, as a team, strategically plan our conference sessions in order to learn new information and share it with other staff. We each try to go to the sessions most germane to our positions. After MLA, we have a sharing time at staff meetings to collectively hear the new information and ideas shared during many of the sessions. My staff is able to gain valuable continuing education credits and process the information by presenting it to their peers. In order to demonstrate the importance of continuing education, my Library Board allows us to close the library one of the full days of the conference so all staff have the opportunity to attend. In addition, this year one of my staff and I presented on the experience and knowledge gained through being a part of the continuing education pilot project for Montana librarians."

Bozeman Public Library - "Recently, our Help Desk upstairs received a beautiful bouquet of flowers with a very sweet card. The sender was so grateful for an employee's patience and knowledge. This patron had been working on something very complicated and our Librarian was able to help her. Not only are conferences helpful for learning new skills, they are helpful to hear other people's stories that staff public desks. We all learn compassion, patience and skills from eachother."

William K. Kohrs Memorial Library - "I always come back from workshops with new ideas to try out at our library. Our storytimes and other children's programs have really improved because of MSL workshops."

Madison Valley Public Library - "This portion of the BVF expense is used for MLA annual conference attendance for all staff members. We are a small rural library, and it's often difficult to find employees who are formally trained in library science. The benefits from this continuing education assistance allow our staff to take advantage of the annual Montana State Library conference to further our professional development, and allow networking with state professionals, peers and vendors. This assistance directly and most positively impacts the quality of service we are able to provide to our community."

Manhattan Community School Library - "The Asst. Director used a portion of the continuing education grant funds to attend the yearly Montana Library Association meeting held once a year. This is the largest gathering of librarians in the state, involving librarians from public, school, academic, and special libraries. The conference provides many workshops and classes of a variety for each library to learn and share ideas and skills. There are always several ideas on programs, administrative issues, technology, and community involvement to bring back that are then used to benefit our own library and community."

Manhattan Community School Library - "Part of the continuing education grant funds was used to attend the Montana Shared Catalog meeting in the Spring of 2019. While 1 meeting is held online once a year to help libraries defray costs, one meeting is held in Helena for vital updates and vote on budget items. The Shared Catalog remains one of our most effective tools in serving our patrons. This allows the libraries to serve their community in a broader capacity than just at the local level. Administrative and IT assistance, interlibrary lending, and exposure to more materials helps us to serve our rural community better."

Sheridan Public Library - "This year's MLA conference was especially useful in that every class I took was applicable to my situation as a solo librarian; from original cataloging help to the class on dealing with emotional trauma in patrons."

Thompson-Hickman Madison County Library - "Library Assistant/Youth Services Librarian Christina Koch attended the entire conference. Altogether, she spent \$323.79 for accommodations and \$225 for MLA conference registration. She enjoyed networking with colleagues from throughout the state. She also gleaned information about Work Flows, plus she attended sessions pertinent to providing children's services. These funds were very much appreciated in allowing her to participate in the Montana Library Association annual meeting."

Drummond School & Community Library - "Traveling to conferences is always beneficial to me! I particularly enjoy the opportunity to network with other librarians and directors. I always, - literally always - return home with something I can implement in my library to make the experience better for patrons in my community."

Drummond School & Community Library - "Drummond's library has begun coordinating with Philipsburg Public Library to share costs and scheduling with a local delivery service for our Partner transits for Onshelf Holds being sent to Partner libraries. Having had to rely on volunteers at times is unreliable and can be frustrating. We appreciate the opportunity to have the means and ability to send our crates to the next HUB library to be sorted and transferred to the loaning libraries."

Drummond School & Community Library - "This may have been the best PLD conference I have attended! I was able to network with other library directors and gain ideas for programming along with the encouragement to try new things in my library. There was training in services to provide to patrons and opportunities to role play different scenarios for meeting challenges that all librarians face with budget cuts, collection development, or community input. Sensory Stations demonstrated programming that I may be able to coordinate with elementary teachers in our district. Coding has become popular in many libraries and I learned about grants that make such programs possible. Since my library is teaming up with the Montana Alzheimer's Association, I found that Marjorie's session used statistics to show how important it is to provide support for our aging patrons and their caregivers. Training in approaching and communicating with stakeholders in our communities was helpful, and realizing the role libraries can play in providing information about government publications increased my awareness. "

Drummond School & Community Library - "Travel From PLD."

Drummond School & Community Library - "Fuel - travel costs to PLD".

Drummond School & Community Library - "Funds were used for travel to the Library Director's Retreat where the director gained knowledge from presenters and other librarians. Sessions included ideas for new programs, training in reporting, and time for connecting and networking with other directors."

Philipsburg Public Library - "Attending the annual Broad Valley retreat allows the librarians and board members to connect with other libraries. This helps us by learning about programming that is working well in other libraries, current technologies and recent trends. We are fairly isolated, this annual meeting helps us feel more connected to other libraries."

North Jefferson County Library District Clancy Library - "MLA and our libraries' situation allowed us to send nearly all our staff/volunteers to part of MLA this past year. Our staff/volunteers (being the amazing ones they are ;)) met and strategically covered the different options and then came back to share the information. It was AWESOME for our staff to learn new stuff and to meet other librarians. They came back with a lot of ideas that they've adapted for our patrons and implemented. Due to their ideas and

enthusiasm we changed the way our public computers and technology help works--we were able to recruit teenagers and develop a good system for helping people get their devices onto wireless, successfully download MML2Go materials. We were also able to organize and make available all of our non-library technology resources (we've got a projector, VHS player, region-free player, DVD drive, MP3player, etc.) so that people realize they are available and can take advantage. It was just really great to have them energized, motivated, and making great changes for our patrons."

Program 3 - Resource Sharing and Technology

Narrative

Funds in this program are used to support resource sharing programs such as interlibrary loan, courier, and book club kits as well as covering technology needs a library may have such as specific software and/or hardware. Examples of ways to use funds include, but are not limited to OCLC, MSC, Courier costs, postage, book club kits, Internet, hardware, peripherals, and software.

Stories

Lewis and Clark Library - "The benefit to Lewis & Clark Library is the access to quality bibliographic records and ILL services. Our patrons benefit by having good, searchable records in the OPAC. They have the added benefit of having a way to access library materials in libraries all over the world via ILL. "

Jefferson County Library - Boulder - "We purchased a new computer that was outdated and also bought a Chrome pad to use during computer coding classes with the junior high and high school kids. We want to expose them to technology that they might not have at home and get them interested in some of the wonderful job opportunities they may have if they stick with learning about computers, coding, etc..".

Jefferson County Library - Boulder - "We subscribed to "Kanopy", an online movie streaming service. Many of our patrons do not have access to movies and documentaries other coming to the library to get them. Unfortunately, our physical building can only hold so many DVDs. By offering this program, we will be able to offer thousands of movies and the children's movies have all been vetted by "Common Sense Media", so the parents can feel comfortable about what the kids are watching."

Jefferson County Library - Boulder - "We purchased the Gale Databases so people could have access to information anywhere they are located. The database package we chose has kids sites, adult sites as well as automotive, consumer reports, etc. The high school sends kids over to the library so we can teach them how to use the different databases and how to cite the websites in their reports."

Broadwater School and Community Library - "Only public facility in the county that has printing available. This is invaluable during tax season. Patrons appreciate the library being open for the copying needs."

Meagher County/City Library - "The streamlining of the cataloging process allows for more time helping patrons!".

Butte-Silver Bow Public Library - "Covered the majority of OCLC subscription expenses (this year's cost was higher than last year). This is a vital tool for cataloging as well as locating materials for interlibrary lending."

Hearst Free Library - "In addition to allowing the Hearst Free Library to afford the services provided by OCLC, this year we used the extra money received after the spring Federation meeting to update the software on our patron computers."

Belgrade Community Library - "OCLC allows our library to connect with library records all over the world! Use of OCLC provides efficient cataloging resources, the ability to import records, and a pathway to find almost any resource our patrons want to locate. We consider OCLC an essential foundational tool for providing service to our community and assisting our patrons by providing unlimited informational resources to the outside world."

Bozeman Public Library - "Our community loves to be able to checkout eBooks and audiobooks through Montana Library 2 Go. One parent recently expressed much appreciation for the audiobooks for car trips with their child. They feel that it has helped the child learn a love of stories through these experiences."

William K. Kohrs Memorial Library - "We often have children looking for a particular book or series they would like to read for school. If our copy is checked out or if we don't have the title, the children are thrilled to find out they can check out a digital copy from Montana Library 2 Go."

William K. Kohrs Memorial Library - "A patron came to the library looking for a rare book that we do not own. There is no digital copy of the book. She did not think it was possible to find it without paying over \$100.00 for a copy. We were able to borrow a copy for her through inter-library loan. She was very happy to be able to read the book!".

Madison Valley Public Library - "Here at MVPL, we do our best to give our community access to information and services that larger population centers often give their patrons. One way we can afford this is by receiving BVF assistance to help take advantage of the technology and professionalism the Montana Shared Catalog provides. We see people from all over the world, and we continually shatter myths of the "small town library." Because of financial assistance that allows us to be part of the MSC and MT2Go, the library attracts potential business owners, home buyers and families that are relocating to Ennis because we can provide professional services that connect them to the rest of the Montana and the world. "

Manhattan Community School Library - "Manhattan Community School Library has been a member of the MontanaLibrary2Go downloadable service for many years. This is truly one of our most appreciated services our library provides. While the Montana State Library has made this as cost-effective as possible

for small libraries, the technology funds help to offset the annual subscription rate. As a smaller library in the state, our rural budget is somewhat limited for physical materials of many kinds. Being able to provide this service without sacrificing our physical materials budget is wonderful! This service has been invaluable to our patrons, whether they're traveling, tech-savvy, accessing materials at all hours of the day."

Manhattan Community School Library - "The remainder of our technology funds goes towards the purchase of new computers in our library. Even though we are a small library, we are committed to providing adequate computers for personal use and internet access to our patrons for research, job search, or pleasure. Current technology and internet access is vital to our small communities in Montana to stay connected on a broader scale. The funds help us replace our computers on a rotation system so that none of them are inadequate."

Sheridan Public Library - "The Shared Catalog's user sharing groups give us the opportunity to have a collection that expands outside our walls. We can specialize our collection to provide materials in other libraries, and other libraries can carry materials we do not. Well over two-thirds of the items requested by our patrons that we do not physically hold are available within our user group (4 Rivers), saving us postage and related interlibrary loan expenses, and giving the patrons confidence that they can order ANYTHING, and we will be able to provide it."

Thompson-Hickman Madison County Library - "We used these funds to partially pay for the \$760.20 subscription for Overdrive and the \$848.00 for our annual subscription to Ancestry (totaling \$1,608.20). These funds are appreciated since they allow us to apportion our budget funds to other subscriptions, including the Montana Shared Catalog and OCLC. Thank you."

Drummond School & Community Library - "The KIC system can be used to scan historical documents, photographs, and other documents to be printed into books and flyers. It is our hope that the school will be able to scan and print our yearbooks; patrons can scan recipes to print cookbooks for fundraising; the historical society can scan images to be shared with local entities as well as the Montana Memory Project and people can scan documents to share electronically with recipients who are distantly located. We received helpful grants from Blackfoot telecommunications and the Drummond Teacher's Organization as well as funds from the district's budget. We plan to host training sessions and programs to let the community know about the system and its usefulness to our patrons."

Philipsburg Public Library - "This membership to OCLC allows our library to do Interlibrary loans and use WorldCat. The interlibrary loans are invaluable to our patrons when locating rare or unusual books. We are able to get these items through the mail from libraries across the country."

Philipsburg Public Library - "Montanalibrary2go (overdrive) allows our patrons to download ebooks and audiobooks onto their own personal devices. Allowing our patrons access to a variety of collections."

Philipsburg Public Library - "We recently developed a website which allows our patrons access to Montanalibrary2go, Partner shared collections, program information and much more. This website opens up our doors to everyone for access from home or afar."

Philipsburg Public Library - "This money was used to purchase 1 new patron computer. We went from having two computers available for the public to three. This allows our patrons to have better access to the information they need with no wait time. We also saved our old computers to be used in a different area for the upcoming census if we need them. "

Philipsburg Public Library - "This money was spent on sharing books within the Partner Share program. This program allows people to get books from over 30 different libraries, in essence expanding our collection to include all those libraries. It took our patrons a little while to get used to looking at other libraries for an item they were looking for instead of just browsing the shelves. Now they are very used to finding authors they like and then placing holds on various books from other libraries. The patrons get very excited when their books come in. This program has been a huge success for the Philipsburg Public library patrons."

North Jefferson County Library District Clancy Library - "Workable quality internet is not something that is readily available for many of our patrons (and those that want to can use the library internet for that if need be). However, MML2Go is HUGE with some of our patrons (and more non-patrons that aren't library

lovers and don't use their cards for anything else ;)). It is especially wonderful with patrons moving from larger metropolitan areas out of state--because MML2Go is comparable often better than the digital library they had access to before they moved. This consortium is extraordinary and allows us to offer a service that is top notch in the world and nothing we could afford or manage on our own. Due to the success/patrons' reception of MML2Go we've taken another giant step/risk for our little libraries and subscribed to Kanopy (streaming media service). We went through our estimated annual budget in 3 months--it was a success ;)".

Program 4 - Community Outreach

Narrative

Funds for this program are used to support outreach and marketing to the community with the hope of increasing awareness of libraries and their value. Examples of acceptable spending in this category include, but are not limited to: costs associated with summer reading programs, homebound services, books by mail, and any promotional materials.
